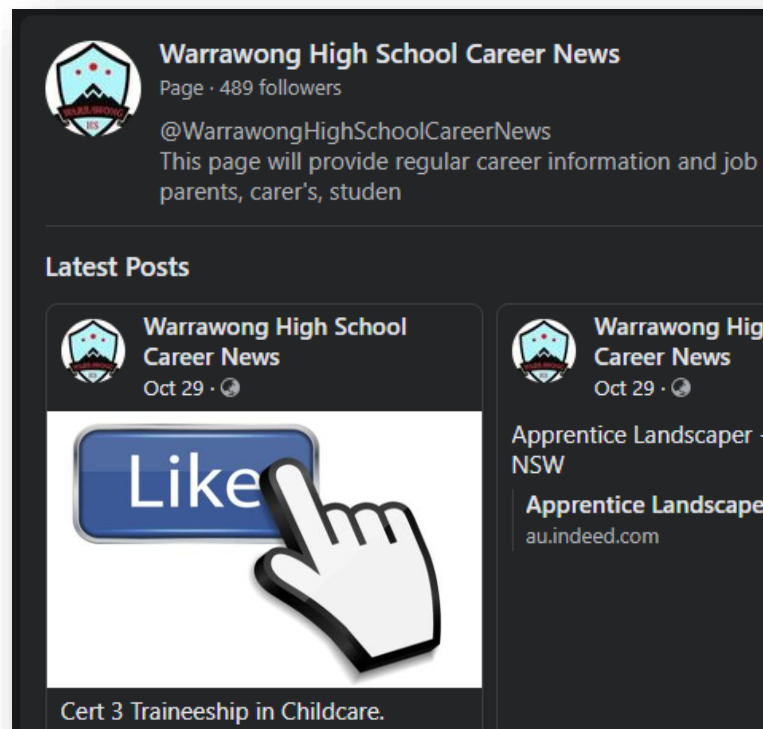

- Other Uni's – Plenty of information in Careers and on the websites.





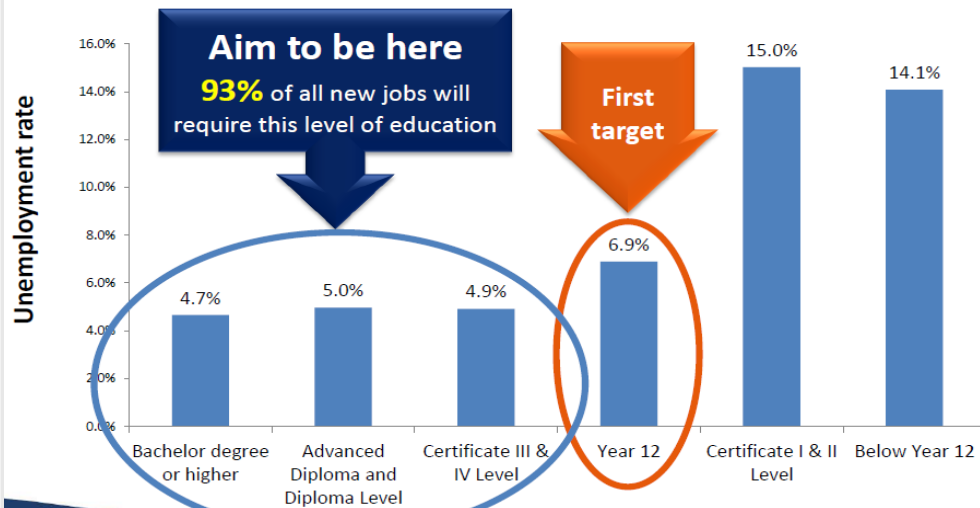
Students not interested in university

Unemployment rate for 25 to 34 year olds, Illawarra

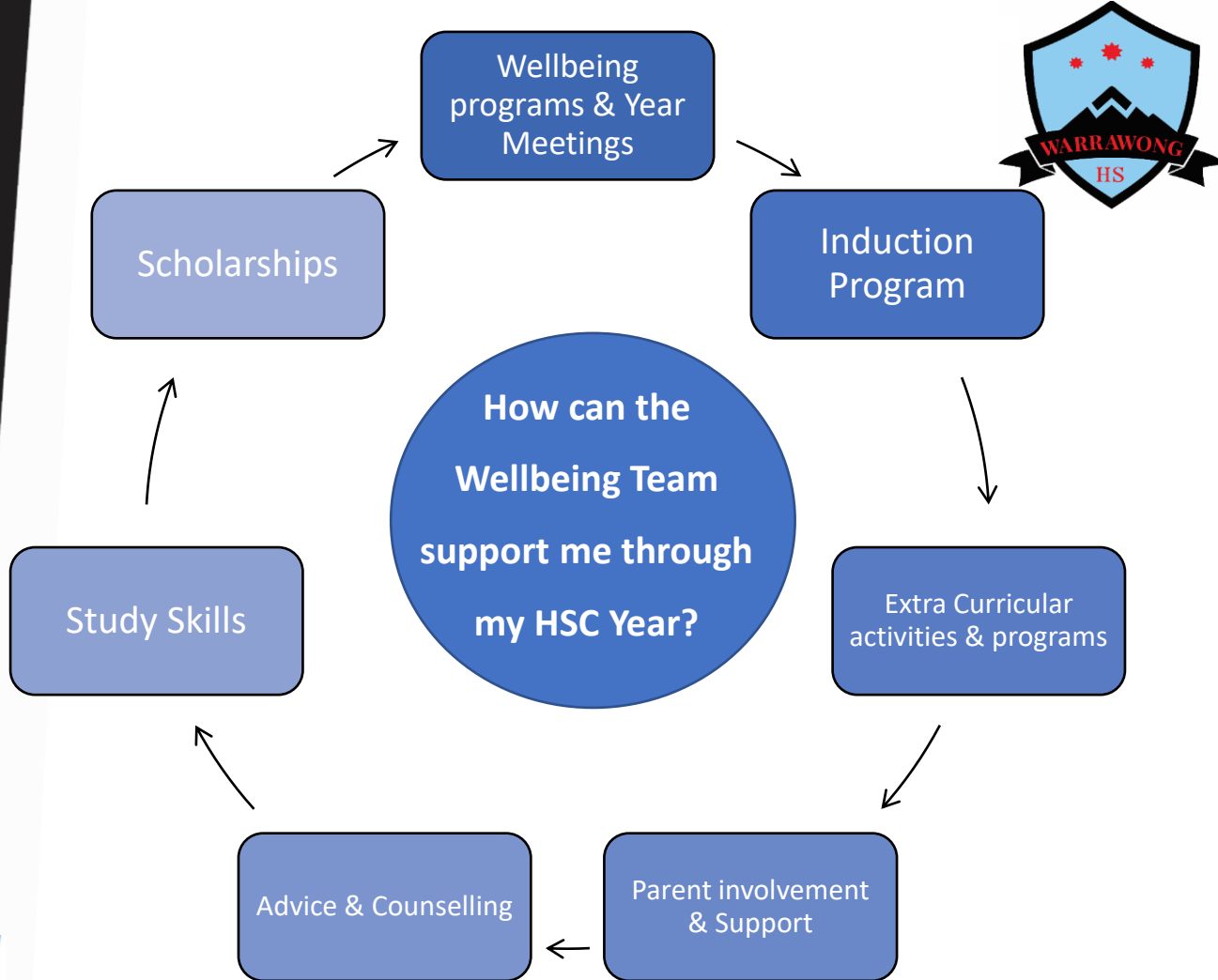

Role of your Year Advisor – Mrs Fallo

- Your Year Advisor is responsible for wellbeing and its impacts on the learning of the students in their year group.
- They work closely with the school wellbeing team and classroom teachers.
- They are usually the first point of contact for parents in relation to any issues or problems about a student.
- Year Advisers are dedicated and an integral part of the school community. They work closely with staff and parents to provide the earliest possible intervention that prevents problems for their students.

Summary of Student Responsibilities

Attendance Basics:

- Read and refer to Assessment Guide and NESA Year 11 – 12
- HSC Roles and Procedures Guide.
- Present your best effort always and follow school rules and teacher instructions.
- Have resources required to complete assessment tasks.
- Satisfactorily explain all full and partial absences.



Summary of Student Responsibilities

Course work:

- Sign off when receiving tasks.
- Present your own work.
- Back up if working on computer.
- Submit on due day before 3pm as per assessment task notification.
- Utilise all possible school support services

SATISFACTORY COMPLETION OF A COURSE

- Students must:
 - **follow the course** developed or endorsed by NESA
 - **apply themselves** with diligence and sustained effort to the set tasks and experiences provided in the course by the school, and
 - **achieve** some or all of the course outcomes
- VET Board Developed Courses require students to complete **mandatory work placement**



Understand and use illness / misadventure / extension procedures

If a student is going to be on leave for any of the reasons listed below, they must apply through the Warrawong High School front office and fill out a Student Illness/ Misadventure/ Absence Application and hand it to their deputy principal prior to the due date of the assessment task(s):

- Family Holiday.
- Illness or Operation.
- Family concerns/complications.
- Other significant reasons for student leave.



Understand and use illness / misadventure / extension procedures

If a student fails to complete an assessment task on the due date, they will receive the relevant penalty if they fail to:

- complete Student Illness/Misadventure/Absence Application, or
- Assessment Appeal Application in consultation with their deputy principal within 3 days after the due date of the task



Penalties

- Tasks not completed on time may receive a zero mark. Whether a student receives a zero mark will depend on whether the student follows the procedures for late submission and/or student absence from a task.
- Whether a student receives a zero mark or not, they must complete the task, or they will be at risk of N determination.



Assessment Task Appeals

- Students have the right to appeal if they feel that they have, in any way, been disadvantaged or treated unfairly with regard to an assessment task.
- Appeals must be in writing using the school Assessment Task Appeal form available from the Deputy Principals. This must be returned within 3 school days of the issue arising ie. when the task is handed back or a request for special consideration is denied.



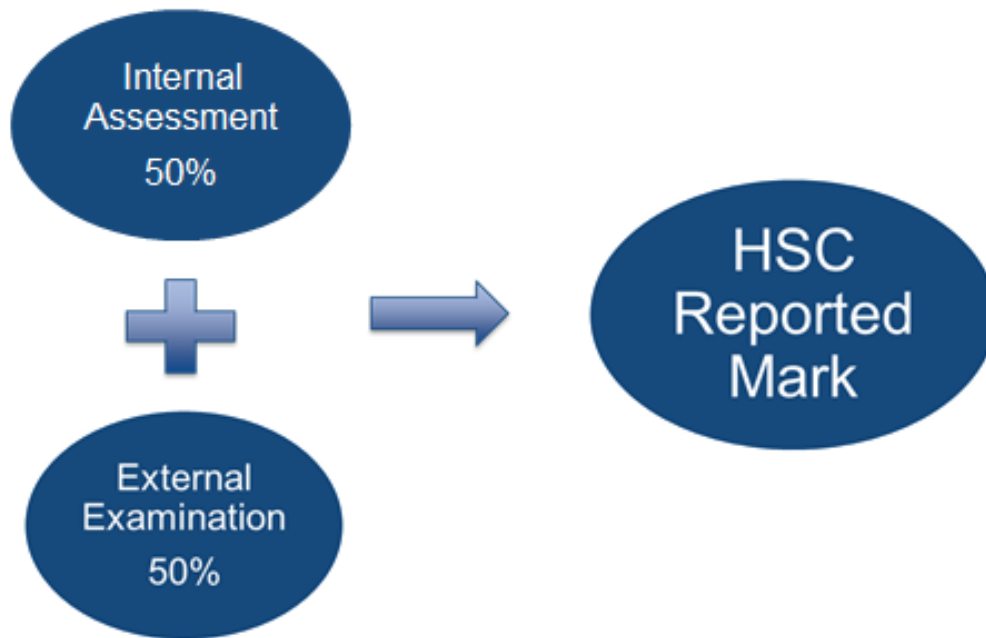
Understanding Key Terms

- Malpractice = copying or allowing your work to be copied
- Plagiarism = direct copy of a document or part of a document without reference to author
- 'N' Warning is issued if a student is deemed to have not met the requirements of a course. An 'N' Warning can jeopardise a student's HSC. Notification will be made via letter and a phone call to parents/caregivers if students are not meeting course outcomes e.g. not completing an assessment task

Requirements for the HSC – meeting the minimum standard in literacy and numeracy

- To be eligible for a HSC students need to demonstrate they have met a minimum standard in literacy and numeracy.
- Students will show they meet the HSC minimum standard by passing online tests of basic literacy and numeracy skills, which are available for them to sit when they are ready in Year 10, 11 and 12 and after the HSC.

Satisfactory Attendance

- Students must attend school at least 90% of all school days each year. Students must meet this attendance requirement until the final day of school, as determined by current Department of Education policy relating to student attendance.

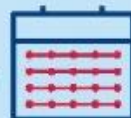

Satisfactory Attendance

- School leave may be granted to cover an extended student absence. It is essential that parents contact the school prior to leave taking place to complete the appropriate documentation including the Student Illness/Misadventure/Absence Application form and to confirm any alternative arrangements that may be required.
- It is the responsibility of the student to collect and complete any relevant assessment tasks and/or schoolwork as determined in consultation with the deputy principal, head teacher and teacher.

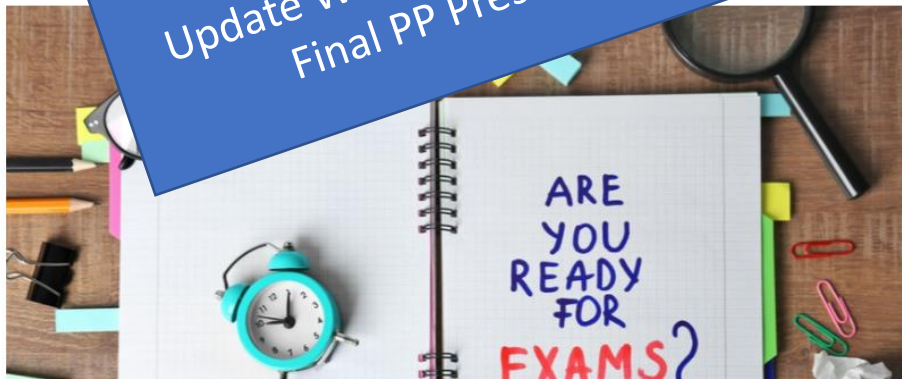
