

Fitness lab a huge boost to school facilities

Students and staff are excited about our new school Fitness Studio Laboratory. It completion represents a major new addition to our school facilities.

Mr Aaron Davis Head Teacher PDHealthPE devised the concept as could see the potential for better using this space. The lab will cater for up to 30 PDHealthPE students, and those who chose the Year 9 to 12 elective PDHealthPE subjects where students will gain a huge benefit from the facility by putting the theory into practice.

The lab has been constructed in our old changerooms that were decommissioned a number of years ago. The central dividing wall and existing shower cubicles and walls were removed. The area was relined air-conditioners installed and a



compressed rubber floor was laid to completely transform the space.

Gym equipment will include 5 Treadmills, 7 Stationary Bikes, 3 Rowing Machines, Barbells, Dumbbell, 15 different weights machines, Hydraulic machines, plus various other pieces

of fitness equipment. In addition the lab includes an interactive whiteboard and Wi-Fi internet so students and staff can have laptop lessons.

PDHPE staff will be running fitness classes before or after school and at lunch times to encourage students to become healthier. PDHPE teacher Mr Josh McCarthy: "a greater effort needs to be made to increase the physical activity of students and improve their nutritional intake".

They did all the demolition including moving 20 tonnes of rubble, the complete relining and the new floor. This project would not have happened without their vision and continued hard work.



Tax Refund on School Fees




