

Principal's Report

Over the last 2 years we have gradually increased expectations of our students and the message is really sinking in. Students must be on time, in uniform with all books and equipment. They must co-operate at all time, do their classwork and spend time on assignments and study at home. On behalf of the staff can I personally thank all parents for your support. There is no doubt that school tone is at a very high level at present and certainly that is a result of the support we are getting from parents. On parent contact - the value of parent contact is immeasurable. When we talk to parents we get to let you know that we are on to things and we are listening. There is no doubt that by keeping parents informed we get the students onside. The impact on the vast majority of students in terms of their behaviour, co-operation and work output rises significantly when they know parent contact is a genuine promise. Staff are constantly encouraged to contact parents and also to use homework diaries for brief notes home. I urge parents to do the same.

Open Afternoon

Our open afternoon was another outstanding event despite the terrible weather. As a staff we were all really proud about the program and how it worked. We thought the best advertisement for the program would be to let some of our visitors and parents on the day do the talking :

Check out our wonderful English results in last year's HSC!

The English faculty achieved three of the six merits which Warrawong HS achieved -- top band marks in English Advanced, Extension 1 and Extension 2).

 58% of our Standard English students received HSC marks between 70 and 100 (the state average is 36% in Bands 4 – 6)

All our Advanced English students received HSC marks between 80 and 100 (the state average is 53% in Bands 5 & 6)

- Our Extension1 student received HSC marks in the top band (the state average for Band 4 is 25%)
- Our Extension 2 English student achieved HSC marks in the top band (the state average for Band 4 is 22%)
- For 68% of our 19 students studying English as a Second Language their HSC mark was either their best or second best mark out of all the HSC subjects they studied at Warrawong High School.

Project Kasparov : Chess

Did you know that playing chess and academic achievement often go hand in hand ?



Many students who have made playing chess a part of their school life have also finished their school careers achieving outstanding ATARs (Australian Tertiary Admission Ranks). In 2011, chess playing student Maros <u>Van Den Burg</u> scored 97 (out of 100). In 2006, Ahmet <u>Ozturk</u> also scored 97 and in 2007, best female chess player Ruveyda <u>Ozturk</u> scored 99.05 just to name

a few. Many other chess playing students like Yuxi Ruan and Steve Yousseff (2010) also achieved the highest Bands 5 and 6 in Mathematics.

The benefits of playing chess are numerous and our school has a strong tradition of being ranked amongst the best chess playing high schools in the region.

As many of our senior students have left, new players are needed for three teams; WHS "A", "B" and IEC team. See Ms. Dus in the IEC a.s.a.p.

By the end of this month our "A" team needs to play against Oak Flats HS and our IEC team will play Edmund Rice College in the <u>Country HS Knockout</u> <u>Chess Competition.</u>

Next term **The Ilawarra Southern Zone Chess Competition** will get under way as well as our annual "friendly" lunchtime chess tournament which will take place in our new library.

Academic Monitoring
