Student enrolments

Each year schools go through a process of predicting the number of enrolments for Years 7 to 12 based on historical data. These enrolment numbers effect our fulltime teaching and non-teaching staff numbers.

This year, with increased enrolments in the IEC, Support Unit and the mainstream high school, we have started the year with 650 students. This is an increase of 70 students from 2014.

We are continuing to work with our partner primary schools to ensure Warrawong High School is the first choice high school for our local students.

Open Day

The Warrawong High School open Day was held on Wednesday 4 March and it would be true to say that the school was really buzzing that afternoon.

Every parent and student I spoke to were extremely impressed with what they had seen and heard at the various displays and demonstrations.



Not only did we have students from Years 4 to 6 come along to the afternoon, there were also people that heard it advertised on the local radio and were interested to come and see the school first hand.









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The Open Afternoon proved to be terrific promotion for the school. Like all school activities, it was so successful because of the staff involvement and many students who participated in the demonstrations around the school. Our SRC students and Yr7 students also did a fantastic job with meeting parents and their children.







School Signs

During Term 4 last year, a decision was made to make the pedestrian entry/exit to the school at the Flagstaff Road gate. This made sense with the crossing and service bus stop already at this point.

It has meant, however, that it is less obvious for visitors and passers-by that this is where Warrawong High School is. With a lot of hard work by Mrs Ramsay, we have installed two new banner signs at top of the pathway to school. These signs look great and include a welcome in a variety of languages.



Parents I have spoken to at the end of the school day say that the signs do look good and create an even more welcoming feel to the school.

We have urged all of our students to be respectful of the signs and report any interference of them to myself or Mr Hughes and Mr Morris.

Road Safety

Although having students enter and exit the school via the Flagstaff Road gate, there is a lot of congestion as the entire school leave all at once on most days.

Students have been reminded of crossing the road safely and walking on the footpaths only. We would like parents to reinforce this message with their children. Parents who pick up or drive past the school in the mornings and afternoons are also reminded to be aware of the speed limits and parking restrictions outside the school. This also applies to Warrawong Public School next door and to our senior students who drive to school.

NAPLAN tests for students in Years 7 and 9 will take place next term on Tuesday 12 May through to Thursday 14 May.

Parents will be receiving a letter home regarding the tests in the near future.

The short film won the "*Most Memorable Experience*" Award at the annual WACKI Film Festival in December last term.

The Illawarra DB Club situated alongside the Illawarra Yacht Club on Northcliff Drive in Warrawong has kindly invited WHS students, Term 1 this year, to get involved in this amazing opportunity (DBP) during sport time Thursday afternoons. To ensure an ongoing commitment we need students to show an interest with a minimum of 10 students required for the sport to continue. All students are required to wear the life jackets supplied. Cost to the students is \$4 each week.

DBP is similar to canoeing except the fibreglass boat holds a larger crew of 20 paddlers arranged in pairs, a drummer at the bow and a sweep steering at the rear.

A colourful dragon head is carved in the bow of the boat and is specially decorated for regattas, where boats from different clubs race each other.

This time last year WHS had a team partaking in the Chinese NY DB racing festivities. Currently, posters promoting the DB **races** for the upcoming Shellharbour weekend of Sport Festival were also been placed around the school.

Green Connect is a social enterprise that works in partnership with Warrawong High School to tackle some of the biggest problems in our community and care for people and planet. We create jobs, particularly for resettled refugees and young people; jobs that help the environment.

Green Connect runs a chemical free farm on land at Warrawong High School, and employs students to grow food. We also work with organisations and at events to keep waste out of landfill, turn food waste into compost and teach people to do this for themselves. Last year Green Connect employed 12 young people and 99 people from a refugee background, kept 85% of the waste we managed out of landfill, and developed our farm. This year we'll also be working with Warrawong High School students to help make the school more sustainable.

Veg Box

Green Connect sells a weekly Veg Box, packed with locally grown, seasonal, chemical-free veg.

Sign-up now. It's the delicious way to help tackle some of the biggest problems in our community.

Each week you'll get at least 10 different herbs and veg, including:

Onions, and other alliums like leek

Potatoes and other root veg like carrot and beetroot

Leafy greens like kale and lettuce

Flowering veg like tomato and zucchini

Legumes like beans and peas

Herbs like parsley and basil.



This Veg Box is available based on a community supported agriculture system. You sign-up and pay for 3 months (13 weeks), and we grow chemicalfree veg locally to **reduce food miles, build food security, and create jobs in our community**. It's a system that creates a direct relationship between you and a local farm, so that we work together to build a more sustainable community.

A Veg Box costs \$40 per week pick-up from our farm in Warrawong. Potatoes and onions come from Foodies, and the rest comes from our farm in Warrawong. To order just call Green Connect on (02) 4243 1537 or email will@green-connect.com.au.
