STEM REPORT

You probably already know that Warrawong High School offers STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Maths) as an elective course in Years 9 and 10 because we know how important these skills will be in your childrens' future.

But here are some things you probably didn't know:

On Sunday, 11 August, Year 9 STEM students travelled to UNSW in Sydney to compete in the Young ICT Explorer NSW Finals after all 3 groups received invitations following a project report submitted to the panel of judges.

Of the final 8 teams in the 9-10 Division, Warrawong High School had 3! A fantastic achievement by our students as they make history for Warrawong High!... BUT there's more! One of our teams placed 3rd in NSW in their division! A huge congratulations to Brayden Hassan, Noah Imrie and David Buckley for their Vision Impairment Text-to-Speech project.

Year 9 STEM students got the opportunity to tour the world-class TRICEP Research Lab to look into the new world of 3D Bioprinting and its potential. They have also participated in a partnership program with UOW called STEM+X aimed at building leadership and communication skills through STEM.

After a 2 day intensive training bootcamp, students delivered STEM workshops to students at Cringila Public School.

Year 9 and 10 STEM competed in the national Science & Engineering Challenge competition. They also participated in a Bluescope STEM careers and skills workshop.

Year 9 STEM students are about to begin a project in collaboration with researchers from UOW to support





We are currently recruiting families who require financial support for educational needs.

What is the Learning for Life scholarship?

Learning for Life provides families with opportunities to increase their children's success at school, TAFE and University. Learning for Life helps each child reach their potential by supporting their education from primary through to post-school studies.

The Scholarship is granted to a student to help support the financial obligations of an education. Two payments a year can assist with purchasing school uniforms, shoes, textbooks, course materials and paying for excursions.

Who is eligible?

To be eligible for the Learning for Life scholarship you must meet the following criteria:

- Possess a valid Health Care Card or Pension Concession Card.
- Demonstrate a commitment to education i.e. students must have and keep a 90% attendance rate.
- Children attend Kindy to Year 8 and have been referred to us by a partner school. Our partner high schools include Corrimal, Warrawong and Illawarra Sports High. Our primary schools are, Bellambi, Corrimal, Corrimal East, Tarrawanna, Warrawong, Kemblawarra and Cringila.

What we ask of families:

To continue to receive scholarship payments over the course of their child's education, families must:

- Show a commitment to their child's education by ensuring their children attend school regularly.
- Complete a short student profile for their sponsor each year.
- Provide a copy of end of year school reports.
- Keep receipts of educational expenses and be able to show these if requested.
- Participate in regular contact and work with their Family Partnership Coordinator.

How do I apply for the Learning for Life scholarship?

If you feel that you know of a family who could benefit from this program, please send a completed referral form to Ellen Land. One family can have up to 4 children on the scholarship. They must all meet the required criteria.



Year 10 students have been engaging in discussions surrounding Stage 6 and their HSC over the past four weeks. The students are about to enter into the last stage of their school journey and at Warrawong High School we believe that choosing subjects for their HSC should not only be a family decision but a whole school decision.

Year 10 students have been surveyed and participated in a Speed Careering day with the opportunity to hear from people from the local business community. Year 10 students also were spoken to at a year meeting regarding NESA compliance, the subject selection process at WHS and the different pathways available to them.

At the Year 10 Subject Selection Evening on the 6th of August, there were a large number of students and parents present, all showing great interest in developing their understanding of the expectations of Stage 6 and the WHS 2019 Subject Selection process. Thank you to those parents and students who attended.

Throughout the evening faculty Head Teachers, course teachers and outside agencies such as UOW, UOW College, ITEC and TAFE, provided support to students and parents as they deliberated over the choices they are going to make over the next term. We were impressed with the student's eagerness and the maturity they demonstrated during the discussions we had with them towards the end of the evening.

If you were unable to attend the meeting, your child would have been provided with the Subject Selection Handbook. The information presented on the night is summarised in the Handbook.

Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday of week 4 will see Year 10 students engaging in course "Taster" lessons. During these lessons they will be exploring the expectations and activities that would be expected of them if they were to select that course to study for their HSC. These "Tasters" aim to inform student choices, ensuring they are choosing the right subject for them.

During Week 5, each Year 10 student will be individually interviewed. Mr Stanizzo (Deputy Principal), Mrs Napier (Head Teacher Sec. Studies), Mr Cattle (Careers Advisor), Mr Freeme (Year Advisor) and Mr Gunner (Head Teacher Administration) will be conducting these interviews in order to provide support in assisting each student to make the most informed decisions regarding subject selections. Parents/ Carers are most welcome to attend the scheduled interview with their child. Prior to your child's interview, please ensure you complete Page 21 and 22 of the Subject Selection Handbook with your child. If you have not yet booked an interview or are unsure of your child's interview time, please contact the school.

HSC MINIMUM STANDARD

From 2020, only students who meet the HSC minimum standard will receive a Higher School Certificate testamur.

Students will be provided with two (2) opportunities per year to pass the standard identified below.

To show they meet the standard students need to achieve:

- Level 3 or 4 in the online reading test.
- Level 3 or 4 in the online writing test.
- Level 3 or 4 in the online numeracy test.
- Some students with disability may be <u>exempt</u> from meeting the minimum standard to receive their HSC testamur.

On the 31st of August, Year 10 students completed the Reading test during an English lesson. Students have already received the results for this test. If your child failed to meet the minimum standard for reading, they will sit the test again next term.

During week 6, students will complete the Writing test. Teachers are currently working across the school to support the students to prepare for this test.

Students are able to sit each of the tests, twice a year. Support will be provided for your child if they continue to be challenged by these tests.

HSC MINIMUM STANDARD

FACT SHEET

You need reading, writing and maths skills to be successful in everyday life after school. That's why you're required to show a minimum standard of literacy and numeracy to receive the Higher School Certificate (HSC) from 2020.

To check you have the basics right, you need to sit short online tests of reading, writing and maths for everyday life.

You get two chances a year to pass each of the tests from Year 10 until a few years after the HSC. Your school will help you decide when you are ready to take each test.

If you pass the online tests of basic reading, writing and numeracy skills you will show you've met the HSC minimum standard.



HOW IS THE STANDARD SET?

The standard is set at level 3 of the Australian Core Skills Framework (ACSF), which means students will have the basic reading, writing and maths skills needed for everyday tasks and future learning after school. It includes skills for tasks such as:

Following safety instructions in equipment manuals

Understanding a mobile phone plan

Writing a job application

Creating a personal weekly budget.

The HSC minimum standard is part of a plan to ensure students have essential literacy and numeracy skills.

YEAR 8 SUBJECT SELECTION PROCESS

The Year 8 Subject Selection process has begun. Throughout years 9 and 10 students will be expected to complete the core courses which include English, Maths, Science, HISE & PD/H/PE. However, they will also have the opportunity to choose 3 elective courses.

Elective courses provide students with the opportunity to engage with subjects that they are interested in and/or support the development of their skills. The skills they during these years will ultimately support them throughout their HSC. It is important to note that elective courses should be chosen carefully and after consideration of the expectations of the course.

Students will receive a Subject Selection Handbook in Week 7. It is important that parents/carers discuss the information presented in the handbook with their child to support the decisions they make as they are now working towards a Record of Achievement (ROSA) and the expectations of their effort, application, attendance and completion of assessment tasks will become more significant.

Elizabeth Jowanie, the guest speaker and a former IEC student from Burma, spoke of her memories of warmth and encouragement from teachers during her time at the IEC.








The audience was treated to a dynamic and energetic traditional Kurdish dance, performed with spirit and enjoyment.
