EVET (EXTERNALLY DELIVERED VOCATIONAL AND EDUCATION TRAINING)

Students still choose 12 units at school and then also apply to do EVET in August of Year 10 through the Careers Adviser.

- These courses are held at private campuses such as TAFE, ITeC, UOWC, KCC etc and are either in school time or outside of school time (They are usually delivered as a 4 hour block one afternoon or evening per week, however some are run all day on a week day)
- Courses offered are PROPOSED and may change There are a number of private institutions all offering similar and different courses. See brochures
- They count towards the HSC. Most are 2 units in Year 11 and 12.
- These courses give you skills along with industry and TAFE recognition.

- Many do not count towards an ATAR. Some do if you sit for the HSC exam.
- You must complete a EVET application form by week 5 to be considered for these courses.
- You must be highly motivated.
- You must find your own way to and from the venue.
- You must be able to perform in a mature learning environment.

School-based apprenticeships and traineeships. These are available when advertised and students go through a recruitment process to receive an offer.

- A school based traineeship combines paid work, training and school. Year 11 and 12 students work with an employer as a paid employee one day per week whilst studying for their HSC and a vocational qualification.
- Depending on the SBAT students could miss 2 days of school a week (one with the employer and one at an RTO).
- The big plus Counts as a HSC subject, vocational training and students receive a qualification (cert II or III) PLUS they get PAID and could possibly lead to future employment.
- School Based Traineeships are available in a wide range of industry areas such as: Automotive, Business Services, Childcare, Retail, Hospitality,

Unique Student Identifier (USI)

- From 2015, anyone undertaking a Vocational Education and Training course (eg: through TAFE or other training providers, but not University) will need to have a "Unique Student Identifier" (USI). It is used to identify you when undertaking any vocational training from the start of 2015.
- To apply for a USI is easy (Google USI or use Careers website) Forms of identification – Medicare card, birth certificate etc and away you go!
- It is expected all students have a USI and record it on the Careers website before commencing Year 11.
